

LEADERSHIP CERTIFICATE GOALS AND OUTCOMES

In partnership with the Asia Pacific Leadership Program (APLP), the Leadership Certificate will help EWC students achieve the following goals:

Learn about the servant leadership model and civic engagement, then apply this knowledge through action plans, community service work and internships (Service Learning & Applied Leadership — I & II)

Develop in-depth knowledge of historical leaders, classical leadership theories and diverse models of indigenous leadership in Asia-Pacific through international film and literature (Film & Leadership course)

Develop personal leadership skills and capacity by studying contemporary theories and designing case studies and profiles of contemporary leaders in Asia Pacific Region (Contemporary Leadership Profiles course)

Organize and facilitate the Fall Service Learning Fair and the Spring Leadership Symposium; edit and publish Transformations in Leadership Journal (Applied Leadership Projects)

Integrate leadership studies into the personal and professional lives of students, including their educational goals at the EWC, helping them become engaged citizens and agents of change in the Asia-Pacific region.

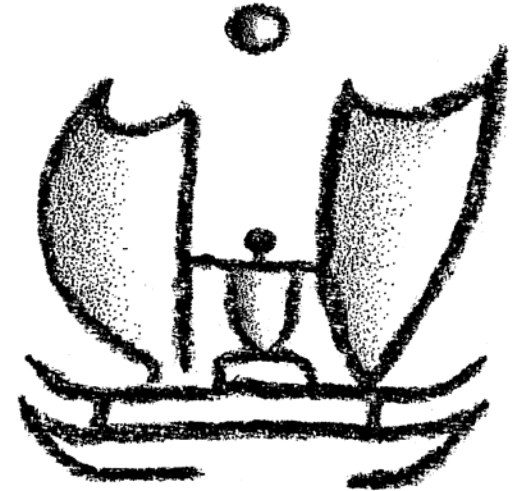

The Leadership Certificate Program

MISSION STATEMENT

The Leadership Certificate brings together students in the East-West Center community to explore the nature of leadership, develop individual leadership capacity, and learn how to navigate change in the Asia Pacific region.

ELIGIBILITY AND REQUIREMENTS

The Leadership Certificate is a two-year, inter-disciplinary program open to all EWC degree fellows. It is one of four Certificate Programs offered to EWC Fellows (along with International Cultural Studies, Conflict Resolution, and Population Studies). ADB fellows are required to take the Leadership Certificate as part of their scholarship. The following are graduate 600-level courses, totaling 12 UH credits. Classes are open to students who sign up for the Leadership Certificate and receive permission from the instructor, Stuart Coleman:

- Service Learning and Applied Leadership, Parts I & II
- Film and Leadership
- Contemporary Leadership Profiles

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

A. Service Learning & Leadership, I & II

"The best way to find yourself," Gandhi once wrote, "is to lose yourself in the service of others." The purpose of these classes is to expose students to the new field of service learning and leadership, which combines community service with the study of servant leadership and civic engagement. This two-semester course will provide students with the unique opportunity to apply their studies in the classroom to their volunteer work in the community. As a class, we will take part in field trips and group service projects with local nonprofits. During the second semester, students will do internships at a particular agency, culminating in a written paper and presentation to the class. These projects will count toward the 45 hours of outside community service that EWC fellows need to complete as part of their fellowship.

B. Film & Leadership

The Hawaii International Film Festival originated at the East-West Center more than 20 years ago in an effort to strengthen relations and understanding among the nations of the Asia Pacific community. Continuing that goal, the purpose of this course is to expose students to a wide range of films and readings that deal with themes of leadership. The course will feature cutting-edge movies and documentaries from Japan, China, Korea, New Zealand, America and other cultures in the Asia Pacific region. The readings will include classic theories of leadership from Sun Tzu to Machiavelli to Martin Luther King, Jr. Students will study universal themes of leadership that transcend time, place and culture, while also examining unique indigenous models. By analyzing the dynamics of leadership through film and literature, students will then develop their own ideas and beliefs about what it means to be an effective leader.

C. CONTEMPORARY LEADERSHIP PROFILES

The economist John Kenneth Galbraith once wrote that all great leaders have one thing in common: "The willingness to confront unequivocally the major anxiety of their people in their time." Balancing the more historical approach of Film & Leadership, this course will examine modern leadership theories and how contemporary leaders "confront" the challenges of their time and fulfill the needs of their particular followers. Students will have the opportunity to research, interview and profile contemporary leaders, including EWC alumni in Asia Pacific, and develop leadership case studies. These profiles and case studies will eventually be published on an internet site and form a databank to be utilized by all leadership education students at the EWC.
